

Pastor's Desk...

If you haven't yet heard me say it several dozen times... our lectionary- the assigned scripture readingsis divided into a three-year rotation: Year A, Year B, and Year C. Each year, beginning the first Sunday of Advent, has a primary synoptic gospel. John and the other two synoptics (from Greek, meaning "see together") are also sampled throughout. Year A is the year of Matthew. Because of how I have been developing as a preacher- with that "teachy" style and liking to do series- I have a particular appreciation for how Matthew is laid out. The anonymous writer of this gospel lumped Jesus' teachings into several discourses- like the Sermon on the Mount. Makes it easier for me to do series or just otherwise talk about the narrative context from one week to the next, how one thing leads into the next. Even though our lectionary divides and tells only portions of any gospel out of narrative order. [sigh-groan]

Matthew's writer quotes the Septuagint (the Greek translation of the Old Testament that was around in the first century) more than any of the other gospel writers, so (presumably) he had a lot of knowledge of Judaism, as we saw during Advent. Naming four First Testament women in his genealogy of Jesus, a genealogy that like all other Biblical genealogies was patrilineal, was a reminder that Jesus not only came from a Jewish family, but a Jewish family with roots from and branches to other places. A story-filled family going back to Abraham, the one whom God had promised would have descendants more numerous than stars in the sky and grains of sand on the beach. What other stories will we remember or re-learn this year?

I've had some recent conversations with some of you- from both conversations- about young people in church. I had a professor in seminary, the late Dr. Carol Jacobson, who often said, "It is a sin to bore people with the Gospel." I think she was quoting a professor she had had, but I can't remember who. But think about that for a moment. Is church boring? (Don't think too hard on this one; the answer is almost always "yes!") Is


the Gospel? It can certainly be presented that way and I'm as guilty as any other preacher at sometimes failing to highlight Jesus' message of grace and liberation for all. So much of what Jesus said was revolutionary in a time when things had become stale and everyone was worried about their own survival in a world of growing inequality, injustice, and oppression. More than the other three, Matthew's Jesus says, "You have heard it said..." and "but I say to you." Matthew's Jesus tells us the "old" and expands it, breaks it open to something new for a world still full of "nothing new under sun," struggling for survival when we can see the vast disparities in wealth between the poorest in one nation against the poorest of another, when injustice and oppression keep us from flourishing in God's image. What in the Gospel of Christ excites you? How do you share the story of your freedom in Christ with those young people you wish you saw on Sunday mornings? How do we set ourselves free to meet in worship of the Triune God that invites not only other people, but all our questions together?

In our families, the stories we tell and pass down tell us and the next generation about who we are and where we come from. Matthew told us Jesus came from Canaanite women, a Moabite woman, and woman who was taken from her family simply because another man wanted her. In the family of God, what stories do we tell, do we pass down to the next generations? What do they say about where our faith is rooted, and where it branches?

Time to Think About Lent!

I know, we're still in the middle of Christmas. But Lent is coming FAST. Looking for input on what we do for the season. Here are the general suggestions. Think about them, and let me know what you prefer. **Midweek Worship:** Do a midweek worship of some sort. Probably keep it short, simple, maybe something



more contemplative.

Book Study: Like last year, do a book study. Suggesting a couple from A-J Levine (but open to other ideas): *Sermon on the Mount: A Beginner's Guide to the Kingdom of Heaven*. Pretty self-explanatory, this is 6 chapters/sessions covering different portions of the Matthean Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount." Since this is the year of Matthew, I want us to do this at some point whether that's Lent or another time. The other A-J idea is *Witness at the Cross: A Beginner's*

Guide to Holy Friday. I know a couple of pastors who used it in their congregations last year and thought it was worth it. This is also 6 chapters/sessions, so either would begin the Wednesday after Ash Wednesday and go through to Holy Week.

Special Topic Study: What's of interest to you that I can put together? Or revamp, like my Evangelism study (6 sessions, designed to be introvert friendly) from internship.

Package Study: A Sanctified Art's 2023 Year A Lent program is called seeking: honest questions for deeper

faith. It's focal scriptures and questions cover Ash Wednesday, every Sunday of Lent, Palm/Passion Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter/Resurrection Sunday. Options include devotional booklet, sermon planning guide (another series!! I do love them), words for worship, children's curriculum, prayers, and several other things. Pastor's Personal Updates

Just a couple of FYIs for those that haven't yet heard:

1) First, Albany voted in mid-December to call Lowell for a two-year term call, effective January 1 (when his current interim contract expires). He will still be three-quarter time, working full-time hours with extra weeks

off (e.g.: six weeks working, two weeks off). His installation service is tentatively scheduled for February, and I'll share the details when they are firm.

2) Lowell and I have also started in the newly created position of Port Chaplain with the Albany Maritime Ministries. This position is supported through a new partnership with Seafarers International House in NYC. It's a part-time, as needed, and our varying church schedules should allow us to tag-team and catch most ships. I'll also be going to Houston, TX in mid-February for a week of training/ continuing education (and Lowell will go next year).

New Year's Day Worship

Faith and Poestenkill will do one shared service at Faith, 10:45am. It will, as usual, be in person and on Zoom (usual link). The service will be a lessons & carols format with the carols being by request (like our hymn sing worship in July).

Advent Hymns of the Day

The stories of Advent Mothers Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, and Bathsheba were the basis for our Advent sermons. There was a special Hymn of the Day each Sunday about the Advent Mother who was the center of the day's lesson. Reading the detail of each of these revealed that Pastor Kate was the writer of the words in each of the hymns that summarized the day's lesson. A hidden talent brought into the limelight! Financial Secretary's Report

Discussion: November's offerings were very low. The church being closed (furnace failure) for two

Sundays contributed to this, but in general offerings are down for the year, which is a troubling trend.

President's Report

Bill Jarosz reported that he spent a lot of time on furnace repair issues. He wishes to thank Fred Howard, Eugene St. John, Rob Hayward, and Mike Moroskey for their work on resolving the issue. Thanks to Sara Martin for arranging the decoration of the Christmas tree and to Donna Van Zandt and Lou Ann Behrens for organizing the Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets for needy families.

Pastor's Report

Pastor reported that we are following a modified liturgy for Advent, and she and D. Van Zandt are planning Christmas services. Christmas Day worship will be available on Zoom and streaming. She officiated at Warren Truland's funeral.

Next year's Synod Assembly will be in Syracuse on Friday and Saturday.

She is officially starting as chaplain for the Albany Maritime Ministry and will need a supply pastor for Feb. 12 to start in that role. She has purchased a new printer that will better meet the church's needs.
