from the pastor...

Pentecost is fast-approaching. It's one of my favorite feast days celebrating the Holy Spirit coming to the apostles, calling and sending them into the world to BE the Church. I love the mystery of the Spirit, who calms troubled waters and troubles calm waters; who comforts the afflicted and afflicts the comfortable. She is Holy Chaos.* At synod assembly during internship, we met briefly in our clusters (conferences); someone said that a major ministry of their congregation "happened by accident" and the cluster dean (also my supervisor) said, without missing a beat, "I think anytime the Holy Spirit hears 'by accident' she clutches her pearls." One of my favorite images ever.

Sometimes Pentecost is called the Church's birthday. Think about how much you have changed in your years of life, sometimes from one birthday to the next. What you were like when you graduated from high school compared to when you left your first job, graduated college, or finished basic training. How you changed over the course of significant relationships- you as a child with your caregivers, your romantic partnerships,

when you became a parent or grandparent. The ways you have grown as a person. The Church is almost 2,000 years old. For an institution to not only last this long, but also thrive, it has undergone a lot of change and growth, has experienced a lot of loss and grief. It has repeatedly listened for and responded to God's call across the globe, seeking to follow the ways of Jesus. It has obviously not always been very Christ-like (e.g.: the Crusades; complicities with evils like racism and genocide; etc.), but I do believe that at the heart of the Christian Church as a whole is a deep desire and yearning to be like Jesus to those inside and those outside the faith. It has had to adapt, grow, and be constantly made new in Christ in order to meet the needs of the always changing world in which it- and we as members of the Body of Christ- find ourselves.

Congregations are small-c expressions of the big-C Church. As members of the big-C Church, we share in the whole Church Christian mission to be like Christ, to follow and live like Jesus, feeding the hungry, caring for the sick, uplifting the oppressed, and rejecting violence (Matt. 5-7, etc.). As small-c expressions, we are called into being by the Spirit who sends us into our communities to walk with our neighbors in valley lows and mountain highs. How we are called to walk with our neighbors in God's love and justice changes over our lifetimes. Like we as individuals may be called to multiple vocations (child, teacher, engineer, spouse, barista, parent, accountant, military or other national service, etc.) throughout our lives, so, too, are our congregations called to be new and renewed throughout our/their lives. For example, I know of a congregation (one I attended during college) that was founded to be the Norwegian Lutheran church in its area during a peak time of Scandinavian emigration to the UP. Down the road (2 blocks if that) was the Finnish Lutheran church. Eventually the Norwegian church became less tied up with its ethnic and national origins, and it began to reach out more and more to the neighborhood and surrounding community (including the university situated directly across the street from the Finnish church), and its mission, or reason for being, was renewed, and has been renewed over and over as it responds to the needs of its "members" and the wider community. Because it has both allowed itself to be changed, to grow and actively sought necessary change and growth, it continues to thrive as a center for ministry in the community.

As we celebrate Pentecost this year, we also think about our congregation. ELCP was founded sometime in the 1800s, shortly before or after the US Civil War. What were our ancestors' founding reasons for putting a Lutheran Church in Poestenkill? What was the reason for merging St. John's and Our Savior to be Faith? Our Savior was a Missouri Synod congregation; why the change to be an ELCA predecessor? When Faith was born in 1991, what was its reason for being? What changes has Faith seen, both internally and externally (local community and outwards)? How does Faith understand its calling to respond to the needs of the community? world?

We've said this a lot, and I say it again: the last several years have been full of change and crisis for you and Poestenkill. And then COVID created more upheaval and instability. As we move into the summer, we are going to begin doing some intentional work together to name the losses and work through the grief. Alongside all that hard work, we are also going to be listening together for the Spirit's calling and sending, discerning how we are called TO BE the Church today in our community and world. Exactly how we are going to do these things... tbd. But, as I recall the promises of my own baptism and give thanks for that sacrament which has joined us together with Christ in death and resurrection, I am/ we are assured of new life over and over and over in the mystery of the Divine Three-in-One/ One-in-Three.

Reading



Most of June's reading is going to be focused on catching up with recent issues of periodicals-*Sojourners* and *Christian Century*- and preparing for how we will in worship and preaching talk about discerning our reasons for being the Church today, and working through the grief of the last few years. But in between all of that, I am looking forward to reading (ok, I'm going to listen to the audiobook), Katie Henry's latest YA novel, *Gideon Green in Black and White* (2022). I don't even know what it's about (something about a kid who plays amateur detective and love film noir),



but Lowell and I have been fans of Henry since August 2019 when we listened to her 2018 *Heretics Anonymous* while driving from PA to IA for his seminary bff's wedding. Henry's protagonists are teenagers figuring out life, and how her characters sort through their questions of family, mental health, friendship, and "meaning of life" feel true, as do the other characters. Whenever she announces a new novel, I preorder the audiobook and Lowell the hardcover.

[For those of you asking, "didn't you go camping to read?" Yes. Yes, I did. Trashy novels poorly written, which I expected given the quality of writing the Netflix series based on them have.



Sweet Magnolias the Netflix series is not great, but mostly worth a single watch-through. The book ... not so much. I'm not even admitting to the other reading, though it was better written.]

Community Violence...

I started writing my main piece for this newsletter in the hours before news broke of shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, TX. Still in the wake of the shooting at Topps Supermarket in Buffalo, which



was followed the next day by a shooting at Geneva Presbyterian Church in Laguna Woods, CA. These were not the only shootings to take place between May 14 and May 24. They were just the best publicized. Which makes sense. They happened in public places- a supermarket; a church; a school. However, mass shootings are often "intermingled with acts of domestic violence"

(https://everytownresearch.org/maps/mass-shootings-in-america/). Gun violence in DV situations also happen frequently at home, and indeed, the Robb Elementary shooter is believed to have shot and killed his grandmother before going to the school. Where he wiped out the majority of a single fourth grade class.

Like one of my seminary classmates has posted, I, too, fear I am running out of tears. We say, "Kyrie elision. Lord, have mercy." But in despair of ongoing violence, I wonder God can have mercy on a people who repeatedly fail to act against such evil. In our baptisms (or affirmations of), we renounced "the devil and all the

forces that defy God;" we renounced "the powers of this world that rebel against God;" and we renounced "the ways of sin that draw [us] from God." We proclaimed to live in God's covenant, "to strive for justice and peace in all the earth" (ELW p.235-7). Have we forgotten?

I *know* that God is always and eternally faithful to Their people, keeping always the covenants made with us even when we reject God and promote evil.



We can always repent and re-turn to the Divine. But repentance requires we lay down that which hurts and harms, that we admit our wrong-doing and wrong-speaking, and pick up peace, truth, justice. We cannot turn away from sin and turn to God at the same time. We may cry out, "how long, O Lord?" We can be assured that God hears us, and feels our pain, too. Why don't we listen when God responds, "how long, my people?" "How long will you reject my Spirit of peace moving in, among, and through you?"

Lord Jesus Christ, your own mother looked on when your life ended in violence. Our hearts are pierced with grief and anger at the mass shootings at Topps in Buffalo, at Geneva Pres in Laguna Woods, at Robb Elementary in Uvalde. We commend the slain to your wounded hands, and their loved ones to your merciful heart, trusting only in the promise that your love is stronger than death, and that even now and always, you live. Amen. (ACS p.49)

First Quarter Financial Report Summary

Thank you all for your continuing financial support of Faith Lutheran Church during the difficult past two years. Faith, like all of us, is feeling the negative financial effects of the pandemic and inflation caused by a confluence of a number of factors beyond anyone's control. So what does that mean for the church as we look forward?

Good news: We are happy to report that collections for the first quarter of 2022 were \$3,344 higher than the first quarter of 2021 and attendance is increasing. However, we must keep in mind that 2021 was a challenging year and that overall revenues were down during that time.

Not so good news: The projected deficit for 2022 is \$67,000 based upon 2021 contributions. In the short term, the church has assets that can help us offset this deficit. Nevertheless, this is a stark reminder that we have much ground to make up in these challenging times. If the current trend of increased giving continues, we can look forward to a healthier bottom line and a brighter future.

With this in mind, it is most important that we continue to give generously as we are able and build on the progress we have made this year. Please prayerfully consider how together we may accomplish this.

May 23 Joint Councils Meeting

The councils of ELCP and Faith met for a joint meeting on Monday, May 23 to discuss a proposal from the Partnership Council adjusting each congregation's worship time.

The meeting began by giving Pr. Kate more information on the history of the Faith/Evangelical partnership and thinking about what it means for the congregations to be yoked under a Covenant agreement. Pr. Kate mentioned that she is planning in this summer's preaching and worship to help each congregation discern how it is called to be the church in their community. *(More on this in From the Pastor's article above.)*

The discussion of worship times started with an historical overview. After Pr. Steve's death, Faith's worship start time continued to be 10:30 until in January 2017 when, at the urging of the interim pastor, it was changed by the Faith Council to 11:00 without seeking input of the congregation. The distressing and unsettling nature of this change on Faith was acknowledged.

At the time that the revised Covenant agreement was signed by both congregations (October 2017), ELCP agreed to a starting time of no later than 9am, which it had been since the congregations were first yoked in 2004. Faith agreed to a starting time no earlier than 10:45,

that was 15 min earlier than Faith's 11:00am starting time in effect at the time the revised agreement was approved.

(During the Covid period there was major disruption leading to various configurations and combinations of all virtual and virtual/in person service formats. See the following history of Faith's service times taken from our Newsletters.)

The partnership council's recommendation was then discussed: for the purposes of giving more time for the pastor and organist to make it safely between services on Sunday morning, and to give the pastor a few minutes to talk with people after worship at Poestenkill, the partnership council's recommendation was to adjust each service time by 15min so that Evangelical would begin at 8:45 and Faith at 10:45, which is in keeping the worship time currently agreed to in the Covenant Agreement. After several minutes' discussion, each council voted. Though not required, the councils agreed to a 2/3 majority requirement for adoption. Evangelical's council unanimously voted to change worship to 8:45. Faith's council had a simple majority but not the required 2/3 majority and the motion failed.

So for now, worship times will stay remain at 9am and 10:30am, and the councils will discuss independently how they wish to proceed in ways which respect the needs and good order of each congregation and the partnership.

The official service starting time, while Pastor Cordes was Pastor, was 10:30. However, due to the length of commute from ELCP, the actual starting time was often closer to 10:45 as I recall.
