We are each made in God's infinitely diverse image. Whether we are short, tall, attractive or unfortunate looking, young, old, middle-aged, able-bodied, disabled, smooth skinned, acne-covered, or so wrinkly it seems our individual skin cells have wrinkles, no matter the amount of melanin in our skin, the color and textures of our hair, what's in your pants and beneath your skin, we each look like God, and God like each of us. In the US, June is a month that invites us to celebrate that infinite diversity with a couple of our



It's Pride month. Rainbows everywhere! I've been reading a couple of historical gay romances by Cat Sebastian.¹ Her male protagonists in 1950s and '60s NYC struggle with personal safety, being who they are, and cultivating healthy relationships when they can be arrested and lose their jobs simply for the suspicion of homosexual activity. In one, Mark is still grieving the loss of his partner a year-and-a-half later; they couldn't marry, so he's not a widow, so what is he now? Who does he go to talk about what he's lost? It won't be until the Stonewall Riots of June 1969 when women start fighting back against a police raid at the Stonewall Inn.² The first Pride parade was held a year later to mark the anniversary. It's obviously gotten bigger since. Pride month is an opportunity for our LGBTQIA+ siblings to celebrate their places in culture, the gains they've made

in legal and familial recognitions, and to advocate and organize for their legal rights. Pride is a refusal to be invisible, ignored, dismissed, harassed; it is resistance against injustice and oppression.

I'm betting most of us white people had never heard of the next one until it became a federal holiday. (I'd heard of it when I was living in WI, but had ZERO idea what it was about.) I now know that Juneteenth marks the "anniversary of the announcement of General Order No. 3 by the Union Army general Gordon Granger on June 19, 1865, proclaiming freedom for enslaved people in TX." June 19. When the Civil War ended, according to Wikipedia, May 9. In his 2019 book, *The Color of Compromise: The Truth About the American Church's Complicity in Racism*, Jemar Tisby reports the Virginia General Assembly, on the question of baptism rendering enslaved Africans free decided in Sept. 1667: "It is enacted and declared by this Grand Assembly, and the authority thereof, that the conferring of baptism does not alter the condition of the person as to his bondage or freedom." This broke longstanding Anglican custom that baptized Christians, being spiritual brothers and sisters, *could NOT* enslave one another. Despite the established tradition, the assembly decided that baptism would *not* confer freedom upon their enslaved laborers. Instead, the newly baptized would remain in physical bondage even after their conversion to Christianity. "Missionaries, ministers, and slaveowners encouraged African Christians in America to be content with their spiritual liberation and to obey their earthly masters." This is a **BOLD** denial of Jesus' life, teachings, death, and resurrection, and a **BOLD** rejection of how we are each created in and bear the infinitely diverse image of God.

Every month is a new opportunity to celebrate our diversity as members of Christ's body. Whether we are members of the skin and just don't understand the pancreas, or wonder why anyone would be proud about being part of the colon, or we really like being a tendon and those lung members don't get why, we are God's and bear that infinitely diverse image to the world.

What is the Pastor Reading?

I said I was reading a stack of trashy novels on my camping trip and that's... not exactly true. I finished the DD Warren book by Lisa Gardner I was reading, then read a vacation mystery, a gay historical romance, and *then*, when I was heading back to the Capital region, a modern romance. And technically another, but a paperback instead of an ebook from the library. [shrug] Anyway, here's some light summer read recs.

Every Time I Go on Vacation, Someone Dies (©2024), Catherine Mack.



This is told from the POV of Eleanor Dash, bestselling mystery author. Her first novel was a sort of cathartic release of the trip she took to Rome after graduating college and before starting her stuffy office job. Almost as soon as she arrived, she met Connor Smith and together they solved a crime. In her novelization of their time together, she changed everyone's name but his. Now, ten years and ten books later, she wants to kill him and have him out of her life for good. But stuck on an Italian book tour with Connor and twenty super-fans, he shows up and says someone is trying to kill him. Is someone really out for him? Is he just trying not to get kicked off in her books so he can keep blackmailing her for royalties? I really enjoyed Mack's use of footnotes for Eleanor's various asides. Without realizing it, I finished this the

same day book #2 in The Vacation Mysteries series came out. Waiting for it to be available on Libby.)

We Could Be So Good (©2023), Cat Sebastian.



Since I mentioned this one and its sequel earlier. Nick is a reporter on the city beat of *The Chronicle* in NYC, 1957? '58? He's a fan of baseball. Not the Yankees, but they're the only NY team after the Dodgers left Brooklyn. New guy on the news floor is Andy. His dad owns the paper and wants him to take it over in another year after he's gotten some on the ground experience. He doesn't know what he's doing. He constantly loses his keys, among other things. But he and Nick form a close friendship, especially as Andy starts dating one of Nick's friends, a photographer in another department of the paper. They go to baseball games together. They work well together. Introduced for the sequel (not really a sequel, but [shrug]) is Mark Baily, the paper's book critic. In his book (*You Should Be So Lucky*), he gets assigned

by Andy in the summer of 1960 to ghostwrite a weekly diary for Eddie, a baseball player newly transferred to the NY expansion team, the Robins, who's in a slump. The books are well-researched for their time and location. They're narrated in the third person, but the inner world of each protagonist is well-explored.

The Truth According to Ember (©2024), Danica Nava.



This is the paperback I picked up at the indie bookstore in Clayton and then promptly started reading at the distillery next door (my kindle was in my car a couple of blocks away; I wasn't planning on stopping to read. Ooops). Anyway, this is Nava's debut novel and in some ways, it shows. In others, I'm not complaining. This is the hottest of the ones I've been reading. Ember- who narrates- has been trying to get a new job for a while, but her resume keeps getting rejected. Eventually, she decides to lie a bit about her qualifications and ethnicity- she checks "white/Caucasian" instead of Native American- it's half true. And then BAM! she gets an interview, lands a dream job, and meets the hot IT guy. Problem: company policy strictly forbids office romances. Too bad because they are both into one another. I'm about two-thirds

through it. They've hooked up, someone at the office knows and could cause problems. More on top her home problems- like her younger brother who basically stole her college money.
