From the Pastor's Desk

This Lent our worship and preaching is going to be a bit different. Generally, the same order of worship and all, but we've adapted a 5-part midweek worship series for Sunday mornings. The focus is on the five senses giving us some intentional meditation on Jesus' own human incarnation as we move through the season from the mountaintop (Transfiguration Sunday, technically pre-Lent) to the cross and the tomb on Good Friday. I'll admit to not being super crazy about this worship idea when it was first brought up. Not because I think it's a bad idea, but because I didn't want to do the extra work involved to ensure a worship service that would make good sense. But now I'm looking forward to us focusing on embodiment because, as I've said before and will say a gagillion more times: we are each made in and bear God's infinitely diverse image. We might wish to bear some of God's more attractive features, but we also never look into the eyes of someone who isn't divinely made and loved.

Our bodies are amazing. We come in so many different shapes and sizes, colors and textures, identities and styles. There are so many physical features we can use to identify and describe ourselves and others- like hair and eye colors, height, weight, assistive devices, etc.- and internal or genetic features that we can't see- like chromosomes, internal organ placement, fetal development. Made in God's image, we can imagine God in a wheelchair, as any gender, any age, with any variety of physical characteristics, hair style preferences. Does

anyone remember the early '00s show Joan of Arcadia? God appeared to the title character- Joan- a teenage girl, based on what aspects of the human God she needed. E.g.: old lady God (played by the great and now late Kathryn Joosten ♥), or "hot guy God" (who she did not make out with). Our scriptures give us a multitude of ways of imaging God- elements of nature, objects, animals, embodied. Sometime take a moment, open the ACS (that purple book hymnal supplement) and turn to pages 268-271 in the back and look up some of these different images for God.

As embodied expressions of the Divine, our theology doesn't happen in some formless void, but through our bodies- as we experience the world and the world experiences us. When we do theology, we name our particularities (race, gender, age, etc.) because the interactions our bodies have with the world influence how we think. Womanist theologian Rev. Dr. Katie Cannon (+2018) talked about the gifts of thinking differently- a black woman doesn't think the same as a white man, and highlighted how our different trainings benefit one another. E.g.: professional theologians are a benefit to those in the STEM fields- just because we can do certain things in science and medicine doesn't mean we should, or that we are prepared for the consequences.

We follow a God who didn't just create us in their image, but became and lived as one of us in human flesh, experiencing human life from birth to death- hunger, headaches, eating, drinking, laughing, weeping, love, friendship, grief, anger, hang nails, constipation, boredom, lust, and on and on and on. As we move through this Lent, a season of self-reflection and examination, let us be present in our bodies, honoring the amazing things they do in health and sickness, good and bad times. As we explore our senses in worship, notice how you experience the Divine in this physical world. Reflect on how your own embodiedness influences your thinking about the world at large. Incarnationally,
